April 19, 2023 SEREAM Spring Conference and Annual Meeting Minutes

Held at the Rochester International Event Center, the conference began at 8:15 with coffee and refreshments.

At 8:45 Rochester's first woman Mayor, Kim Norton welcomed everyone to Rochester. She related how education prepared her for public services including State legislator, and Rochester Public Schools Board chair.

At 9:00 Jay Haapala, AARP, Assistant Deputy of Community engagement gave an interesting account of the founding of the National Retired Teachers Association that established a pension and insurance system for retired teachers. This led to the formation of AARP. So REAM, a state unit of NRTA, is partly a forerunner of AARP. Jay reported AARP's community engagement opportunities, warned of new scams with self protection tips. Avoid is best; recovery often impossible.

Anita Hellie, REAM president, briefed us on REAM needs and tips for increasing membership. Chuck Hellie reported trips offered through REAM.

After a short break Jay Stoffel and Doug Anderson, Executive Directors of TRA and PERA gave detailed updates on the two pension plans and both shared what they thought might happen in the future.

Tim Moynihan, REAM Vice President and Legislative Co-chair shared his thoughts on what has happened in the legislature and what he expects will happen. He informed us on what we can do: contact our legislature.

At noon: Canadian Honker served lunch, time to speak individually to REAM, SEREAM, and RARE leaders, and distribute minutes and financial reports.

At 12:30 Nancy Kampmeier honored our deceased educators.

At 12:35 Barb Hunter, SEREAM president, called the business meeting to order.

The secretary report was motioned for approval by Don Zwach, and seconded by Sharon Baratto, motion passed. No questions about the treasurer's report. New business: Membership dues to remain at \$10 recommended by the board. Motion made by Ben Baratto, seconded by Edna Thayer, motion carried. Nominations for offices of secretary and vice president, no nominations made. Thus no offices voted on.

Motion made by Lyle Olson to adjourn the business meeting, seconded by Ben Baratto, motion approved. Meeting adjourned at 12:50.

SEREAM Legislative Report May 2023

The 2023 Minnesota Legislative Session has come to a conclusion, and a clear picture of what impact the results will have on Minnesotans is, at the present time, less than 100% clear. This article, however, will endeavor to explain the effects of pension legislation for retired educators who are SEREAM members. Stay alert for updates in the coming months.

First off, the Legislative Commission on Pensions and Retirement (LCPR) and its actuaries recommended a down turn in the assumed rate of return for the TRA and PERA pension plans from 7.5% to 7.0%. What this means is that the funding ratio of the two funds will appear less attractive, and the date of the plans being fully funded will be set back several years. If you recall, TRA staff projected that that body would be 100% funded by 2048. That target is, in all probability, no longer achievable. Lowering the assumption rate doesn't impact retirees in the present, but lowering it does mean that work has to be done to maintain the health of the pension funds. Investment results by the State Board of Investment (SBI) and contribution rates by active members and school districts help to guarantee that the funds remain in good shape.

As set in law, the current COLA for TRA members is 1.1%. On January 1, 2024, retirees can expect a COLA that reflects that number. Further, 2023 pension legislation includes a one-time increase to retirees of a 1.4% lump sum payment of their monthly benefit (example: \$2000 monthly benefit X 1.4% = \$280). That's a ballpark figure so you can get your calculator out and estimate the sum that you will receive by accessing the TRA website and your personal account. Those payments should arrive in March of 2024, and they are not compounded to your current benefit. That is, if your current benefit is \$2000 a month in 2023, it will be \$2000 + 1.1% in 2024, after receiving the lump sum payment.

Finally, the governor and the legislature recognized the need to address the issue of the current full retirement age of 66. With the loss of the Rule of 90, more and more active teachers are expressing their concerns about remaining in the classroom until full retirement age or retiring early with a penalty assessed on their benefits. \$458 million was invested in the pension plans through the SBI to help bolster the plans going forward. That one-time money cannot be used for benefit increases. Instead, it is intended help our plan reach 100% funding in the future.

Please keep in mind that pension dollars = personal independence and power. As retirees, we certainly understand the importance of the financial security pensions contribute to our lives. I believe the next chapter of advocacy should be for those who have not enjoyed the benefits that the Rule of 90 affords retirees. We need to work hard to get the legislature, TRA and the LCPR to work toward a solution for active teachers as they approach retirement. No one should experience benefit reductions because they didn't remain in the classroom until they reach age 66.

Please consider getting actively involved in your local retired educator group. Become a "card carrying" member of SEREAM and REAM and, better yet, find out how you can be directly involved, fighting to keep pensions both viable and vibrant. Power resides in numbers. All aboard!
